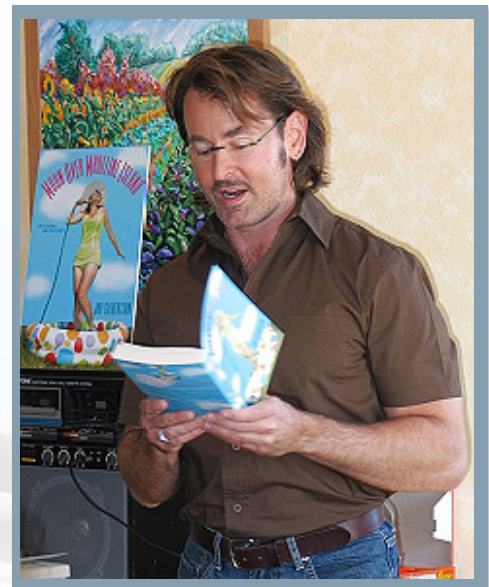
Prairie Farm writer to speak March 28

Artwork by Cumberland Middle and High School students was featured at the library in a free art show last month.

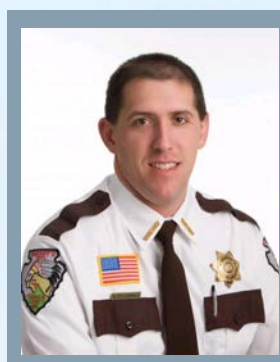
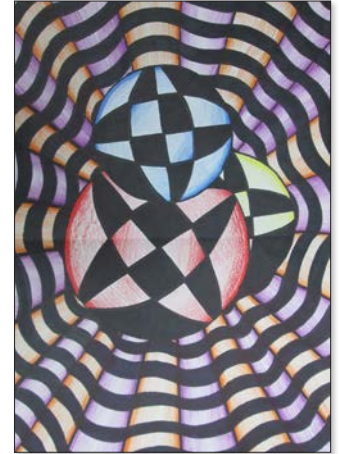
Students' work included drawings, paintings and pottery created using a variety of mediums. Many of the pieces move to WITC-Rice Lake in March, where they join artwork

Family Photo Month

February is Family Photo Month at Thomas St. Angelo Public Library.

Robert Nugent of RMN Action Photography partners with Thomas St. Angelo Public Library and Kinship of Cumberland and Turtle Lake in February to offer free professional photographs to Cumberland area families in response to the Olivia Act.

The Olivia Act was established by an anonymous photographer to honor the victims of the Dec. 14 Newtown, Conn. tragedy and named after Sandy Hook Elementary School student Olivia Engel, whose parents had a family portrait taken shortly before her death. It asks photographers to offer free family photographs.

Participants may decide what special bonds constitute family in addition to biological relationships, such as Kinship kids, their mentors and families; work groups; teams; clubs and groups of friends. All

are encouraged to participate.

Businesses, teams and other groups should contact Nugent directly at 715-296-0967 to set up a date and location for photographs.

Contact the library to learn how to include pets. Each photograph will be put onto a disc for the family or group.

Freewill donations will be accepted to help the library and Kinship continue their support of area youth through reading and other cultural enrichment activities and events, mentorships and mid-year school supplies.

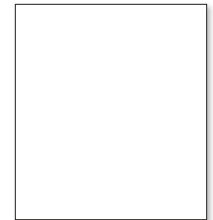
Chocolate adds flavor



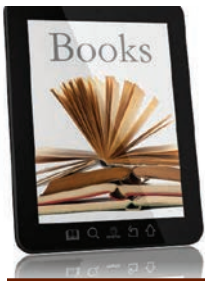

Thomas St. Angelo Public Library now opens at 9 a.m. Monday-Saturday.



Existing staff cover the additional hour, so library patrons should expect fewer staff on duty than at the end of the day.

Hours were expanded in December in response to patron requests, and many are expressing their appreciation for the change, said library director Lori Bock.

"They come to town to run errands or exercise or have morning coffee and used to end up waiting in our parking lot for us to open," she said.

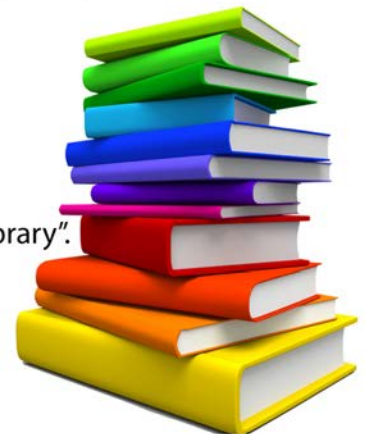
